The MĀPUNA LAB is a place of respite for those experiencing colonial trauma. Our work is na'au centered and focused on health, healing and the longevity of overall well-being of ALOHA. Guided by 'ōhi'a as our kumu (endemic Hawaiian tree), like our kupuna (ancestors) we work in reciprocity and partnership in healing the chronic and existential pain of historical and intergenerational trauma with our brothers and sisters of Moananuiākea (Pacific).

Acknowledging the land as our communities health as water cycle resilience, the lab looks to the cloud catching, truth-telling, 'ōhi'a lehua (*Metrosideros polymorpha*) for ways to ho'i ka wai, to remove seen and unseen emotional blockages to restore waters (waiwai) stolen by trauma.

Aimed at creating safe spaces for co-learning, the Māpuna Lab convenes all those who believe that when Indigenous leadership is uplifted, wellness is accessible to all.

Participants will engage in the Ahupua'a Model for the 'Ohana Center of Excellence, introduced by Lilinoe Kauahikaua of Papa Ola Lōkahi looking at the impacts of colonization, and implementing cultural intervention at various places effectively providing healing and wellbeing of self and community.

3. Learning Objective 2

a. Participants will engage in the Ka'ao Framework (Hua, Ha'alele, Huaka'i, Ho'ina, Hā'ina - implemented by the University of Hawai'i through the Hawai'i Papa o Keao Initiative) - utilizing Hawai'i traditional myth culture as a framework to transform the experiences and the culture of healthcare professionals and providers.

4. Learning Objective 3

a. Participants will see by implementing a high quality program such as the Huaka'ihele, that is directly recovery-oriented, trauma-informed, and equity-based as a means of improving behavioral health and overall well-being guided by the clinical expertise of R. Lahela Kruse, a Native Hawaiian Social Worker.

5. Learning Objective 4

a. Participants will engage in subtle and evolutionary shifts to inspiring Hawai'i health & mental wellness leadership with a professional & personal experience with the guidance of Kekuhi Keali'ikanka'ole through Lonoa Honua.

6. Learning Objective 5

a. Finally participants will be invited to experience and engage in multidisciplinary and multidimensional processes for sequencing HUAKA'I.



Suicide rate among NHs ages 15–44 is the highest compared to all of Hawai'i's major ethnic groups.



What is a Huaka'i

Huaka'i - / hua.ka'i /

nvi. Trip, voyage, journey, mission, procession, parade; to travel.

Who is Hi'iaka

Hi'iaka - / Hi'i.aka /

- 1. *n*., First part of the names of the twelve younger sisters of the goddess <u>Pele</u>; the youngest and most famous was Hi'iakaikapoli o Pele
- 2. (Not cap.) n., A rare variety of taro with bronze-red leaf and stem, used in medicine.
- 3. (Not cap.) n., A variety of sweet potato.

Crater, Kīlauea, **Hawai'i**, named for Pele's many sisters called Hi'iaka, the most famous being Hi'iaka-i-ka-poli-o-Pele (Hi'iaka in the bosom of Pele), who journeyed to Kaua'i to fetch Pele's dream lover, Lohi'au (PH).

- Trained in the tradition of Hula 'Aiha'a & Hula Pele, chant & ritual for 35 years under Hālau O Kekuhi and graduated as Kumu Hula (hula master) in 2008
- Bachelor's in Hawaiian Studies
- Master's degree in Professional Development in Education
- Doctorate candidate of Holistic Health program.
- Assistant Professor and Coordinator of the Hawai'i Life Styles program (designing the Hawai'i Life Styles degree program and student support center as well as the two-year A.A. degree programs in Hula, Fishing, and Farming at Hawai'i Community Colleges).
- For the 21 years at the University of Hawai'i, Kekuhi has been instrumental in writing for and managing 10 federal grants, resulting in excess of 20 million dollars of Congressional funding, USDOE funding, and others helping fund 8 new positions in Hawaiian studies (HawCC), 4 renovation projects, student support for native Hawaiian students, the UH system's first degrees in native occupational practices and the very first Hawai'i protocols program of any UH system college. She also taught many of the programs courses.


