How to use this guide

Category

This guide is organized into three main categories, as described below. We recognize that some of the resources provided may apply to more than one category, and are indicated with such.

- (PRE) for Prevention: Activities implemented prior to the onset of an adverse health outcome (e.g., dying by suicide) and designed to reduce the potential that the adverse health outcome will take place.
- (INT) for Intervention: Activities designed to decrease risk factors or increase protective factors.
- (POST) for Postvention: Activities following a suicide to help alleviate the suffering and emotional distress of the survivors and prevent additional trauma and contagion.

Community

Each resource is indicated with the community or communities that they are relevant to, indicated with:

- (AA) for Asian American
- (NH) for Native Hawaiian
- (PI) for Pacific Islander

Focus

Each resource may have a location focus and is identified with:

- (N) for nationally focused
- (R) for regionally focused
- (L) for locally focused
- (NA) for not applicable

Description	Resource description: The Ahupua'a Model highlights the interconnectedness of land, people, and culture, aiming to heal historical and cultural traumas among Native Hawaiians. This traditional resource management system divided land from mountains to sea, fostering balance and sustainability. Today, it supports interventions that strengthen family ties, preserve traditional knowledge, and respect the land, crucial for reducing trauma's impact and promoting resilience. By addressing root causes of trauma and embracing cultural strengths, the model empowers Native Hawaiians to reclaim their heritage and foster meaningful healing and growth.		
	Training description: Through this training, participants will learn about the Ahupua'a model for cultural healing developed by Papa Ola Lokahi. They will discuss ways the model can be applied to the self, 'ohana, kaiaulu (community), as well as larger care systems in Hawaii. Participants will also provide their perspective on how this model resonates and applies in their own everyday life.
